Sir Harry Smith Community College - Outbreak Management Plans (August 2021)

This document brings together key measures as outlined in

• <u>Contingency framework: education and childcare settings August 2021 (Published June 2021</u> and revised August 2021)

All education and childcare settings should have outbreak management plans outlining how they would operate if any of the measures described below were recommended for their setting or area. This includes how they would ensure every child, pupil or student receives the quantity and quality of education and care to which they are normally entitled.

'...As COVID-19 becomes a virus that we learn to live with, there is now an imperative to reduce the disruption to children and young people's education - particularly given that the direct clinical risks to children are extremely low, and every adult has been offered a first vaccine and the opportunity for 2 doses by mid-September...The government has made it a national priority that education and childcare settings should continue to operate as normally as possible during the COVID-19 pandemic...' (Contingency framework: education and childcare settings Revised August 2021)

Measures affecting education and childcare may be necessary in some circumstances, for example:

- to help manage a COVID-19 outbreak within a setting
- if there is extremely high prevalence of COVID-19 in the community and other measures have failed to reduce transmission
- as part of a package of measures responding to a Variant of Concern (VoC)
- In line with Stepping measures up and down measures contained <u>HERE</u>

The following principles apply when considering decisions affecting children's education at SHSCC and when enacting any of the measures described below:

- This plan will only be enacted following advice from either/or Local Authorities, Directors of Public Health (DsPH) and PHE Health Protection Teams (HPTs) who will be working in collaboration with the Regional Schools Commissioner (RSC)
- SHSCC will not take decisions in isolation but collaborate with Aspire Trust through the CEO and Board of Trustees.
- SHSCC will endeavour to keep any measures to a minimum and thereby affecting the least number of children for the shortest possible time.
- SHSCC will keep all measures under regular review and lift them as soon as the evidence supports doing so.

Measures to ensure wellbeing will follow similar measures imposed successfully by SHSCC in previous lockdowns and will include wellbeing checks and vulnerable children protocols all managed through Year Teams to minimize workload for staff and ensure every child is supported.
Remote Education	 For those who cannot attend school due to restrictions SHSCC will: 1. Ensure all children have the technology to access remote learning both through highlighting key individuals as vulnerable and educating on site or providing laptops that have been retained on site to meet need. 2. Ensure a full timetable of remote learning is delivered to each student 3. Reintroduce protocols for all staff to deliver lessons in line with the SHSCC remote learning policy
